It's Beginning to Look a Lot Like Christmas Sharing the Spirit of the Season at the Salvation Army

Margo Thein, 90, has shared her musical talents with seniors for more than three decades (and more than two decades as an RSVP of Central Oklahoma volunteer). Throughout the year, Margo plays at local senior centers, assisted living centers, and nursing homes.

"Music has always been a part of my life. It makes me happy and it makes the people I'm playing for happy," said Margo.

Margo, who said she began playing the piano as soon as she could stand up and reach the keys, takes her song selection, called Mem'ry Lane, with her each week and shares with her audience sheet music, tells the history of the songs, and plays the piano while they sing along.

"It's just a joy every time I go to play," she said. "I am convinced that it keeps me young."

Margo is bringing Christmas cheer each Tuesday to seniors at the Sequoyah Senior Center, one of four senior centers operated by the Salvation Army of Central Oklahoma. The Salvation Army, a valued partner agency since 1993, is busy year-round providing support to families and individuals, including seniors, who struggle day-to-day financially. The organization stands out most noticeably as a symbol of Christmas this time of the year when bright red kettles and Angel Trees begin to dot the city. Donations raised through the Salvation Army.

Volunteers are the key to making the Red Kettle fundraiser and Angel Tree program work, said Major Paula Powell.

"Our name is the Salvation Army, and an army is made up of many people," she said. "There is no way we could ever accomplish this without the wonderful service and dedication of volunteers."

Angel Tree volunteers are needed Dec. 1-22 to help with sorting, lists, and packaging, Volunteers can work from 9 a.m. to noon or 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Creating Connection through Volunteering

Doug Meise helps to keep the warehouse shelves of the Mid-Del Food Pantry ready and stocked for local residents who are served on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. The pantry serves anywhere from 30 to 80 individuals a day, he said.

As a long-time volunteer, he has helped in a variety of ways, from picking up food donations to helping in the office and checking in clients. During the early days of the pandemic, Doug, like a lot of volunteers, paused for safety reasons, but once safety precautions were put into place, he stepped back in confidently, and it felt as if he didn't miss a beat.

"It's been rewarding to help people," said Doug, who has recently begun serving as a RSVP Advisory Council member.

Doug, who retired from the Air Force after 21 years of

service, and from the Oklahoma Corporation Commission after 16 years, has filled his time with volunteering. In addition to the Food Pantry, he is also a tax-preparer with the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program. He likes to help young people think through their financial picture and the possibilities of saving for their retirement, he said. Also, he was a part of the Oklahoma Honor Flight program and flew on seven of the 24 flights that took veterans to Washington, D.C., to visit memorials dedicated in honor of their service.

"It really just feels nice to help people," he said. "And I enjoy being around the other volunteers."
