After Thirty Years, Provide-A-Ride Program Closes

A letter from Executive Director Beth Patterson

30 YEARS OF SERVING OUR COMMUNITY

The RSVP Board of Directors and I recognized a need in our community 30 years ago that we confidentially knew we could help to bridge. At that time, older, low-income adults who could no longer drive, and who needed rides to their doctor's appointments, had limited transportation services available to them. In 1994, RSVP of Central Oklahoma launched Provide-A-Ride and recruited volunteer drivers who for three decades provided compassionate, safe, and reliable medical rides to the elderly in our community.

We have taken a lot of pride in being able to meet that need for 30 years with 335 RSVP volunteer drivers, providing 1,330 low-income elderly clients nearly 135,000 rides to their doctors.

EFFECTS OF THE PANDEMIC

Since the pandemic, due to fear of being exposed to COVID, feeling high anxiety levels, and family

concerns, 67 percent of our volunteer drivers chose to discontinue driving for Provide-A-Ride. Despite many concentrated volunteer driver recruitment efforts, we didn't rebound to pre-COVID numbers. Also, after talking with our Provide-A-Ride clients, we have learned that 75 percent of them feel they can secure rides to their doctor appointments from their family, friends, church, or neighbor.

STEWARDING DONATIONS WITH WISDOM

With thoughtful consideration, the RSVP Board of Directors decided it is time to wrap up the Provide-A-Ride program, ending April 2023. As our Board President Kathleen O'Toole noted, "... this is a decision to continue being good stewards of our financial donations. With less volunteer drivers, we are serving less seniors. Since the pandemic started Provide-A-Ride has only met 35 percent of our goals."

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At Infant Crisis Services, RSVP volunteer Linda Suchak, 73, is known as the toy guru.

The Warr Acres resident has been a faithful volunteer for 18 years giving time to several nonprofits, including Mobile Meals, but her real passion for many years has been with Infant Crisis Services, an organization that provides formula, food, diapers, clothing, and even toys for babies and toddlers.

Linda said she loves checking in the donated toys, used and sometimes new, assuring that they are age-appropriate, in good condition, and safe for children. "I'm just a senior citizen who still plays with toys," she said. "That is the one particular duty at Infant Crisis Services that I have loved the most."

Linda is the youngest of 10 children, born and raised in Oklahoma. She graduated from Oklahoma State University with a degree in early childhood education. In 2004, she retired from the State of Oklahoma after serving 34 years in the field of childcare licensing.

"Volunteering brings to my life a sense of purpose," she said. "I'm able to do something to help— something that helps parents who may not have the finances to provide toys for their children.

Children need play because that's how they learn—they develop physical skills, cognitive skills, people skills, social skills. It really helps me to feel like I'm doing something to help a child."

Partner Agency Highlight Regional Food Bank

Our partner agency, The Regional Food Bank of Oklahoma does incredible work in our community to help older adults who are on fixed incomes. Partnering with the Oklahoma City Housing Authority (OCHA), its Senior Pantry Program currently has two on-site pantries with eight more to open in the future.



Having the pantries onsite within clients' buildings is a plus for seniors with limited mobility and lack of transportation. Special Health Projects Manager Mason Weaver says, "Senior food pantries simply cannot run without dedicated volunteers. We're always looking for friendly faces to greet our residents and help them pick out groceries, as well as sharp minds to shelve, stock, and keep our shopping space clean and organized. Seniors helping seniors make our housing authority food pantries different than any other food assistance program."

Neighbors Helping Neighbors

Gwen Wallace said her volunteering began in 2008 after watching television and seeing Hurricane Gustav evacuees from Louisiana get off a bus in Oklahoma City where they would live in a Red Cross shelter.

"I had just retired from the school system and had a year of doing nothing," the Oklahoma City resident explained. "I saw these people getting off the bus with nothing in their hands. My friend and I jumped in with the Red Cross doing volunteer work."

Once their volunteer work ended with Red Cross, they asked, "What can we do now?" That started a long relationship with the Mobile Meals program at her church in Spencer, St. Luke's Baptist, an RSVP partner, as well as with other Mobile Meals programs in the Spencer area.

"This volunteer program helps me deal with serious life disruptions," Gwen said. "I lost my sister and then eight days later, my granddaughter died suddenly. Being able to help others took that sense of loss and gives me a sense of pride."

Gwen, who is 78, said that volunteering also gives her physical and emotional health.

"When you don't move those joints, they start getting rusty," she said. "I get up, volunteer at least three days a week, help with the prepping, and I really love developing relationships with my clients and other Mobile Meals workers. It gives me a sense of contentment in my life and helps me release the stresses, anxieties, and depressions that sometimes come with getting older."
