RSVP Volunteer Terry Smith Helps Community Through Amateur Radio

As a retired Naval medic, Terry Smith has volunteered through RSVP of Central Oklahoma since 2015, providing services to support disaster response, aid, and recovery efforts. One of the unique ways that Terry supports these efforts is through amateur radio, commonly called "ham radio." RSVP staff joined Terry and his fellow ham radio enthusiasts from the Oklahoma City Autopatch Association (OCAPA), a local amateur radio club, for Field Day 2024, a national amateur radio emergency communications exercise sponsored by the American Radio Relay League (ARRL), to learn more about ham radio and how Terry uses his passion to connect with others and serve in the community.

According to ARRL, use of radio communications began in the very early 1900's, and in 1912, Congress passed the Radio Act, which required amateur radio operators to be licensed and which re-

stricted the wavelengths available for its use. Today, ham radio operators can be found the world over and can earn three levels of licenses through the FCC - Technician, General, and Extra - which build upon each other to allow use of additional radio frequencies, or bands.

Terry first earned his ham radio technician license in 2011, and since then, has continued to study to earn more advanced licenses. Along with other members of OCAPA, Terry has provided volunteer communications services for the Oklahoma City Memorial Marathon, Liberty Fest, local continued on page 2

parades, and many other events. In addition, he and the group members provide backup communications support to emergency management personnel and storm spotters during and after local disasters. Terry has also served as the security and medical officer at OCAPA events and, at the 2024 Field Day exercise, ran the "Get On The Air" (GOTA) Station – a station for brand new and unlicensed operators to try out ham radio firsthand!

With Terry's coaching, Laura McRaniels, Executive Director of RSVP of Central Oklahoma, briefly went on the air via the GOTA Station. "It was such

Their enthusiasm for this hobby-turned-passion was infectious, and it was truly amazing to learn all the different ways these skills can be applied to disaster aid and communications services. Terry reported a popular quote among ham radio operators is, "When all else fails - amateur radio!"

Community Partner Spotlight:

City Care

City Care, founded in 1996, offers several programs that provide preventative care, emergency relief, recovery, and ongoing support for community members experiencing or at risk of homelessness and related kinds of instability. These programs include Whiz Kids, which provides tutoring and mentoring to kids in first through fifth



grades; Supportive Communities, which provides safe, affordable housing and stabilizing resources; Homeless Services, which provides free, year-round, low-barrier, pet-friendly emergency overnight shelter for families and individuals; and Mobile Outreach and Engagement, which offers two free shuttle routes between City Care, their partner agencies, and support services in the Oklahoma City metro.

Maggie Hudson, Volunteer Coordinator at City Care, reported that they have provided over 143,500 nights of rest over the past three years, and have bandaged wounds, served meals, and celebrated guests' achievements and key life events, all while offering kindness, respect, clean clothes, and more. She says, "My favorite part [of working at City Care] is getting to know the people we serve. [...] We get to witness remarkable stories of transformation, and I hope I never take that for granted."

Did You Know?

Along with offering volunteer opportunities with Whiz Kids and at the City Care Night Shelter, City Care partners with RSVP's KnitServe program. Through KnitServe, crafters of all skill levels can create specific handmade knitted and crocheted items for guests at the Night Shelter and for individuals and families moving into permanent housing. This collaboration also provides opportunities for KnitServe to bring the joy of crafting together with City Care's Supportive Communities. •
