RSVP Volunteer Rita Culver Helps Community Thrive

When Rita Culver retired, she wanted to use her free time to make a difference, so she decided to look nearby for places to volunteer similar to the Regional Food Bank where she had previously volunteered through her employer. She found the Mid-Del Food Pantry, and Bonnie Waldrop, the Assistant Director at Mid-Del, connected Rita with RSVP of Central Oklahoma in 2021.

"Once I joined RSVP, I found out about other places I could volunteer. Although I was already volunteering at Mid-Del one day a week, I wanted to do a little more, and do something meaningful while being outside in nature," Rita said.

When she heard about the opportunity to volunteer at Skyline Garden, she talked with Jamie Williams at RSVP to get connected, and soon began volunteering at Skyline as well. Now, during the spring, summer, and autumn season, Rita helps plant, harvest, wash, and package the fresh, organic produce

grown in Skyline's Garden, which is then distributed to qualifying clients through their Food Resource Center. This winter, while the garden wasn't producing, Rita added yet another volunteer role to her repertoire — setting appointments for people who need vision exams at Skyline's Eye Clinic.

"I volunteer because I want to get to know my community, and also, I want to help people," says Rita. "Helping people giving them better lives actually helps me too, and helps our community. We want our community to thrive."

When asked what matters to her about being an RSVP member, Rita says, "RSVP gives me opportunities to volunteer, meet new people, make new friendships, and learn what I am capable to do. It makes me happy to be able to help the community. If the community is doing good, we are doing good as people.

We have to help each other.

That's what it is all about!"

Meet Our Partner: Mid-Del Food Pantry

Mid-Del Food Pantry has partnered with RSVP since 1992. Since that time, over 125 RSVP volunteers have served over 180,137 hours at the Pantry, including serving on the board of directors, offering computer help, stocking and organizing food and materials, and assisting clients. 26 RSVP volunteers currently serve at Mid-Del, and you can join them! 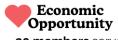

A New Logo & Redesigned Branding

RSVP of Central Oklahoma is proud to debut our new logo! The rebranding effort began in May of 2024 after receiving feedback that the original logo, which was intended to reflect RSVP's ties to Ameri-Corps, was not communicating the mission and work of the organization effectively. This project was led by a Strategic Rebranding Subcommittee comprised of RSVP volunteers Jim Watson, a retired Professor of Design from UCO; Betsy Fry, owner of FryPan Pardners tradeshow and event consulting and management company; and Karen Jacobs, RSVP Board member, retiree from Oklahoma DHS, and long-time Oklahoma non-profit advocate. The design itself was created by RSVP staff member Andrea Post following research on best practices for branding and many interactive brainstorming sessions, concept development meetings, reviews, and fine-tuning of the final design concept by the Subcommittee.

"The new logo conveys RSVP's focus on connection and all the ways RSVP, our volunteers, and our partners connect and engage around service and in community. Gold represents our golden years—the richness that comes from the expertise and commitment of our volunteers, which is the basis of all we do—while royal blue conveys the sky-like vastness and professionalism of RSVP, and nods to our continuing connection to our past, to AmeriCorps, and to the Oklahoma flag," said Andrea.

RSVP is especially grateful to the Subcommittee and all who contributed to the project. Please look for the new logo on our website, social media, and publications in the months ahead.

When I caught up with her, she mentioned how much she looks forward to the three months she volunteers for VITA. This year will be her third tax season. Mary Geiger, a volunteer at MidDel Food Pantry, commutes nearly an hour twice a week to serve. She started there five years ago, right before the pandemic.
